2

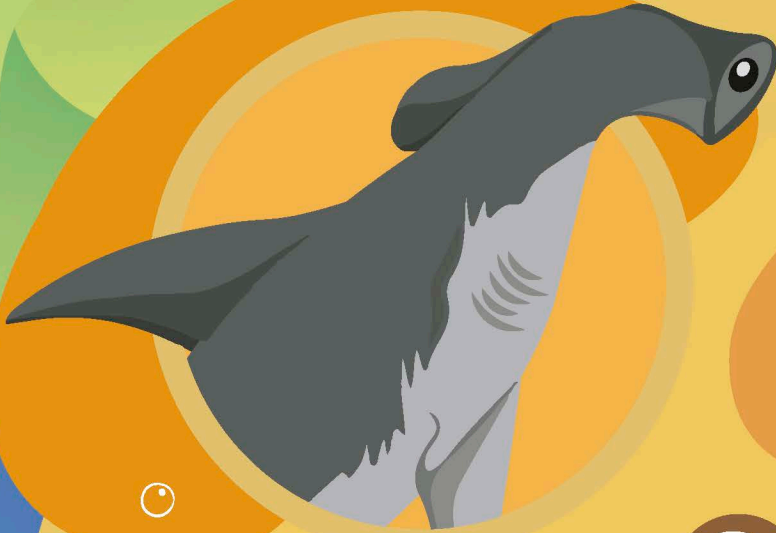
If cut in half, each part can regenerate itself forming two jellyfishes.
